November 21, 2024 Board of Trustees Open Meeting Review

The Board wishes to remind residents that the Board Meeting Review is not the official minutes. This publication is designed to keep residents informed regarding decisions and discussions within the community. Once approved, the official minutes are posted on the community website.

On November 21st, the Open Board meeting was called to order by President Bob Ryan. Also in attendance were Ken Stufko, Vice President, George Schlittner, Trustee and David Landy, Trustee. Jill Horowitz, Secretary, was absent. Thank you to Patty Holmes for taking the notes for this review.

Bob Ryan, President, began the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance.

President's Opening Comments:

Tonight, we will be focusing all our attention to the Finance Committee presentation of the 2025 FSUF budget. Before we start, let me remind you there are agendas on the rear table to help you follow the Trustees agenda. Also, we have a custom of requesting questions before we vote on any Action Item and tonight will not be any different. We will also continue with the custom of having a question-and-answer period before we end the meeting.

Most know we have a Priority Snow program for our neighbors who have medical priorities. For those not familiar with this program, plowing and shoveling priorities are placed for homeowners who may need medical attention after a storm. The BOT requests you notify our Community Manager via her email or Sylvia, our Assistant, on Monday or Thursday while she is present. Emergency personnel may also request priority plowing etc. A note for priority service must accompany your request from a medical professional or supervisor. Please, act now! Don't wait for the first snow fall.

Community Management:

- The thermostat in the gym has been replaced and the heat is now working. Our vendor charged us almost \$700 to repair the damage from the old one being torn from the wall. Parts are also on order to repair the A/C unit. The air conditioning is not working until the part arrives and is replaced.
- The Ellisdale Road truck exit gate has also been repaired from someone hitting the cross bar and leaving the scene with a vehicle. There was a problem with the Optimum Wi-Fi signal.
- The rear gate (Coronet Drive) now has Butterfly working again. There was a problem with the Optimum Wi-Fi signal. Sylvia has phoned Optimum to request strengthening the Wi-Fi signal. As a reminder, when Butterfly doesn't work, your fob or HID Card will scan, and the gate will open.
- The Lobby heat has also been repaired.
- Fire Hydrant whips have arrived, and a test bracket has been ordered to ensure a correct fit. Take comfort in the fact there are old whips still on hydrants to make them visible in deep snow.
- We continue to have all types of vehicles speeding and not observing New Jersey traffic safety laws. N. J. State Police will be on site to enforce our laws.
- The Indoor Pool is currently closed. A motor has worn out and needs to be replaced. Mary, Community Manager, has requested expedited service in securing a new motor. The motor controls the level of chlorine in the water while circulating the water to quickly destroy any type of bacteria. It is unsafe for anyone to use the pool until repairs are made. The community will be notified as soon as the repair is complete, and the pool is reopened.

2025 Proposed Budget Presentation

- Dave McMullen, Treasurer, presented the proposed budget to residents. An explanation was provided regarding the NJ law requiring all HOAs to fund the reserve account yearly in an amount based on the most recent reserve study.
- It was highlighted that approximately 90% of expenses are fixed so there is not much room in the budget for cutting expenses.
- The HOA fee will increase by \$20 per quarter, an increase of 1.66%.

Questions:

1. **Was a comparison of the gates vs. a manned gatehouse completed?** Yes, the difference was approximately \$200,000 lower to have gates.
2. **Why is the city water so far over budget if the community relies mostly on the wells?** The iron content of one of the wells is too high and therefore city water must be used to supply that particular area.
3. **Does the Grounds budget number include snow removal?** Yes
4. **Will there be communication soon from Taylor Management regarding process of payment of the dues?** Yes, early December. Residents should stop any auto payments currently set up. New coupon books will be sent out to residents who pay by check.

Action Items were Approved as Follows:

BOT – Approval of the FSUF Budget for 2025

Grounds – General Maintenance of the Community Trees - \$349.00 (Growing Concern) Remaining balance paid via credit for not planting winter flowers.

Committee Reports:

House & Recreation: Cheryl Fintz, Co-Chair, reported on the success of Stiletto & The Saxman performance. She mentioned two upcoming events: Dec 14th Holiday Brunch and Dec 31st New Years Eve party. The Giving Tree, benefiting students in the Upper Freehold School District, is located by the gym entrance.

Grounds: Mike Martzhal, Chairperson, reported on the process for the selection of the new 3-year landscape contract with Growing Concerns. Trees and overgrown shrubs by the Clubhouse have been cleaned up. Seventeen new trees will be planted in December. Well #8 is being refurbished and permits are being obtained. Pilot program beginning with Rutgers for trimming of tree roots on certain properties. Grounds is requesting that residents remove any ornamental items on driveways and front walkways before snow removal takes place to avoid any damage. Residents who currently have downspouts diverted to the driveway should divert them to the yard for the winter to avoid driveways becoming a sheet of ice.

ACC: If you have completed an ACC approved project at your home, please submit the Property Modification Completion Form.

Trips & Tours: Trip to Longwood Gardens is coming up. The committee will take a hiatus during the winter months.

STEM: Bill Brown reported that the committee is working on a community signage project. The committee is looking into improvements for deteriorating signs and will provide a recommendation to the Board. He advised that several methods to address speeding in the community were reviewed and having the NJ State Police come in was the most sensible and cost-effective option. The committee is looking for additional volunteers.

Special Announcements:

- Toy Drive is currently in progress to benefit clients of the Allentown Food Pantry. Volunteers are also needed at the pantry to help with the distribution of the collected toys. Contact Barbara Schuman or Rosemary Albach for information.
- Dec 15th: Hannukah Celebration and Israeli Dance Class. Contact Karen Arwas for information.

Questions & Answers:

1. *Is someone managing the current indoor pool repair to ensure the burned-out motor problem is fixed timely?* Yes, the Community Manager is working with the vendor.
2. *Is there a law in NJ about the direction of walking and biking on roads?* Yes, In New Jersey, pedestrians should walk on the left side of the road or its shoulder when there are no sidewalks or paths for pedestrians. This is to face approaching traffic. Bikers should ride with traffic.

President's Closing Comments:

Board President Bob Ryan thanked Stan Horowitz for all he has done to make the ballroom A/V system upgrade happen. Reid Sound has assured us that FSUF will enjoy many enhanced features and new equipment for years to come. Once completed in early December there will be a training session for key users of the equipment.

Bob continued by sharing information in regards to the 2025 property tax assessments. A letter from Upper Freehold Township Tax Assessor follows this review.

Next meeting will be Thursday, January 23, 2025, at 2:00PM in the Ballroom. There is NO meeting in December.




The Allentown Senior Committee (ASC) Holiday Festival

Re: 2025 Property Assessment

Dear Property Owner,

Over the past four years, property values in Upper Freehold Township have experienced substantial growth, reflecting a steady upward trend in the real estate market. To ensure equitable tax distribution, the Township is required under P.L.2013, c.15, to reassess all properties each year at their current market value.

We are writing to inform you that your property's assessed value has increased beyond the municipality's total net value increase of **21.75%**. (Your assessment will be reflected on your post card notification, which you should have already received.) This adjustment reflects changes in the market, and while it does not imply that your assessment is inaccurate or requires an appeal, it does suggest that a tax increase is likely.

In the past, some property owners have overlooked these notices, leading to unexpected tax increases in the third-quarter billing. To help you navigate these changes, we have outlined the following key points and guidance:

Assessment Based on Market Value: The assessed value of your property is determined by its estimated market value. If you believe this assessed value does not accurately reflect a realistic selling price in the current market, particularly when compared to three to five comparable property sales, we recommend considering appropriate steps to address your concerns.

Review and Appeal: If you disagree with the assessed value shown, you may file an appeal with the Monmouth County Board of Taxation at <https://secure.njappealonline.com/prodappeals/login.aspx>. Forms, instructions, and an Appeal Guide to the process *Understanding Property Assessment Appeals for Monmouth County* may be obtained by clicking on *User Guides* at the top of the screen (<https://secure.njappealonline.com/prodappeals/Download.aspx>), or through your municipal assessor. Assessment appeals filed with the Monmouth County Board of Taxation must be filed on or before January 15 or 45 days from the date mailed, as it appears on the front of this notice, whichever date is later. If the assessed value exceeds \$1,000,000, you have the option of filing your appeal directly with the Tax Court at PO Box 972, Hughes Justice Complex, Trenton, New Jersey 08625. Pursuant to N.J.S.A. 54:3-21(a)(2), all assessment appeals filed directly to the Tax Court must be filed on or before April 1 or 45 days from the date mailed as it appears on this assessment notice, whichever date is later.

Tax Calculation: The current year's assessment will be used to calculate your property tax bill. Please do not estimate your taxes by multiplying last year's tax rate by this year's assessed value, as this will not provide an accurate amount. Instead, we encourage you to use the Monmouth County Tax Estimator to get an estimate of your tax bill and review the top 10 most frequently asked questions to better understand the reassessment process at <https://oprs.co.monmouth.nj.us/Oprs/GoogleWithUC/TiaraSearch.aspx>.

Upper Freehold Township is committed to fair and accurate tax distribution. We understand that any increase can be challenging, but these adjustments are necessary to ensure that each property owner contributes their fair share. While no one welcomes a tax increase, being informed about these changes can help with planning and preparation. We urge you to carefully review your assessment notice and contact us if you have any questions.

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Grounds Committee

Winter is here! Time for your Grounds Committee to start thinking about Spring. In December we refreshed the community's Daffodil flower beds, adding more bulbs. We selected the flowers for our Spring planting: mixed colored SunPatiens for the main gate island, street side flagpole hedge and back gate. The clubhouse walkways, portico, and inside flagpole hedge will have a mix of red and white Begonias.

This fall we planted twenty-five trees throughout the community. To diversify our tree population, as a trial, we planted 5 Thuja Green Giant Arborvitae, a new species to our campus. When mature, the Green Giants will be forty - sixty feet tall, twelve - eighteen feet wide and they will grow between 2 – 4 feet per year.

The change in season is a great time to perform maintenance, we trimmed seventeen trees, mostly lower branches, and removed seven diseased trees. Completed the leaf cleanup project and winterized the irrigation and well system.

Resolved an erosion issue at the clubhouse small pond, filling in the eroded area with river rock and improved the plantings in the area. We completed a pilot program to prune the tree roots of five homes. Evaluation of the program will take time to determine if root pruning is an effective way to control the damage caused by tree growth.

Winter is here, the snow removal equipment is ready to go. As a reminder, when we get snow, we do not plow driveways that have cars parked in them. When the forecast is for snow, we recommend parking in the clubhouse parking lot. Have you removed the flower planters and other things from your driveways? We do not want to damage them in the snow removal process.

Winter is here, yes, it is a little cooler, but a nice sunny day is a great time to get out and enjoy the winter look of your community.

Prior to FSUF, Julio worked as a Handyman at another adult community before finally finding his

“work home” with us. Julio and his family, including Partner, Diana and their two children Diego, 8 years old, and Matthew, 2 years old reside in Hamilton.

Julio has been employed by Planned Building Services since 2012 (12 years), 10 of which he has worked at FSUF conducting janitorial and custodial services. His day begins at 8 AM when he opens the FSUF Clubhouse for the day. First, he ensures the entrance, lobby and business offices are cleaned and refreshed. He then moves onto the Fitness Center, Rest Rooms, Kitchen, Multipurpose Room, Crafts Room, Reading Room, and Billiards Room, Sports Lounge, and Ballroom where he makes certain the spaces are clean and in order from the previous day’s activities. Julio confers with the Management Office for the upcoming day/evening’s events to prep and set up. These include parties, meetings and activities such as the BOT Meetings, Committee Meetings, Book Club, exercise and dance classes and others, too many to list. Committee Chairs and Event Organizers often reach out to Julio about specific needs for their meeting or event, i.e., placement of tables and chairs. Julio ensures the janitorial closet is well stocked with supplies for the Clubhouse.

Path to US Citizenship

To achieve United States citizenship, one would need to be a permanent resident of the United States for 5 years, have a naturalization interview and pass the English and Civics Tests. The English Test is where one must demonstrate an understanding of the English

language specific to the ability to read, write and speak basic English. The Civics Test is in an oral format in which the applicant must answer a random 10 questions from a list of 100 possible questions; 6 of which must be answered correctly. Once accomplished, the applicant receives his date for the swearing ceremony in becoming an official US citizen.

Twinkle, Twinkle Little.....

Snowflake

Within a blink, January has shown its frosty face. Most of us are not prepared for the cold winter months ahead. However, to brighten up this frigid season, it's always fun to add a bit of sparkle. The sparkle of these handmade snowflakes will not make you cold; instead they will put a smile on your face as well as on the faces of all who visit your home. Shake up those old glitter containers and let's get started.

Materials:

- Clothespins – regular and small
- White Paint
- Paintbrush
- Glitter – silver and teal
- Glue
- Scissors
- Twine or Ribbon
- Plastic Snowflakes (optional if you'd like to add them to the center of your snowflakes)



Directions:

Begin by twisting the clothespins. That will loosen the wire up. Now, remove all of the wires. Once this is done, begin gluing the clothespins together as shown in the picture below.



Do this for the small and large clothespins. Once the glue is dry, paint the snowflakes with the white paint. (You can use any color you desire.) Paint the front and back of each snowflake. When the paint has dried, spread glue on the face of each snowflake. Following this, sprinkle glitter on each snowflake. Use different colors for each size snowflake.



You can use them as wall hangings, add them to wreaths, or use them as ornaments. I hope this project makes you *“shine with pride”* when it is completed.

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French Onion Soup

Here's a simple French Onion Soup recipe that's rich, flavorful, and easy to make!

Ingredients:

- 4 large yellow onions, thinly sliced
- 4 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 teaspoon sugar (optional, to help caramelize the onions)
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 4 cups beef broth (or vegetable broth for a vegetarian version)
- 1/2 cup dry white wine (optional)
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 teaspoon fresh thyme leaves (or 1/2 teaspoon dried thyme)
- Baguette slices, toasted
- 1 1/2 cups grated Gruyère cheese (or Swiss cheese)

Instructions:

1. **Caramelize the onions:** In a large pot, heat the butter and olive oil over medium heat. Add the sliced onions, sugar, and salt. Stir occasionally and cook for about 25-30 minutes, until the onions are deep golden brown and caramelized. Lower the heat if needed to prevent burning.
2. **Add wine and broth:** Once the onions are caramelized, add the wine (if using) and let it simmer for 3-4 minutes until slightly reduced. Pour in the beef broth, add the bay leaf and thyme, and season with pepper. Bring to a boil, then lower the heat and let the soup simmer uncovered for 20-30 minutes.
3. **Toast the baguette:** While the soup is simmering, preheat the oven to 350°F (175°C). Place the baguette slices on a baking sheet and toast them in the oven for about 10 minutes until crispy.
4. **Assemble the soup:** Once the soup is ready, remove the bay leaf. Ladle the soup into oven-safe bowls, place a toasted baguette slice on top of each bowl, and generously sprinkle with grated Gruyère cheese.

5. **Broil the soup:** Place the bowls under the broiler for 2-3 minutes, until the cheese is melted and bubbly. Watch closely to avoid burning.
6. **Serve:** Carefully remove the bowls from the oven, let them cool slightly, and enjoy your homemade French Onion Soup!

Tips:

- Caramelizing the onions properly is key to getting the rich flavor.
- You can adjust the thickness of the soup by adding more or less broth.

1. JULIA CHILD

Following the war she married Paul Child, whom she had met while working for the OSS in India. In 1948, while in Paris for Paul's work, she began to take cooking lessons at one of the most prestigious culinary schools in the world, Le Cordon Bleu. She would go on to revolutionize American cuisine through her French cooking school, award-winning cookbook and world-renowned television programs.
